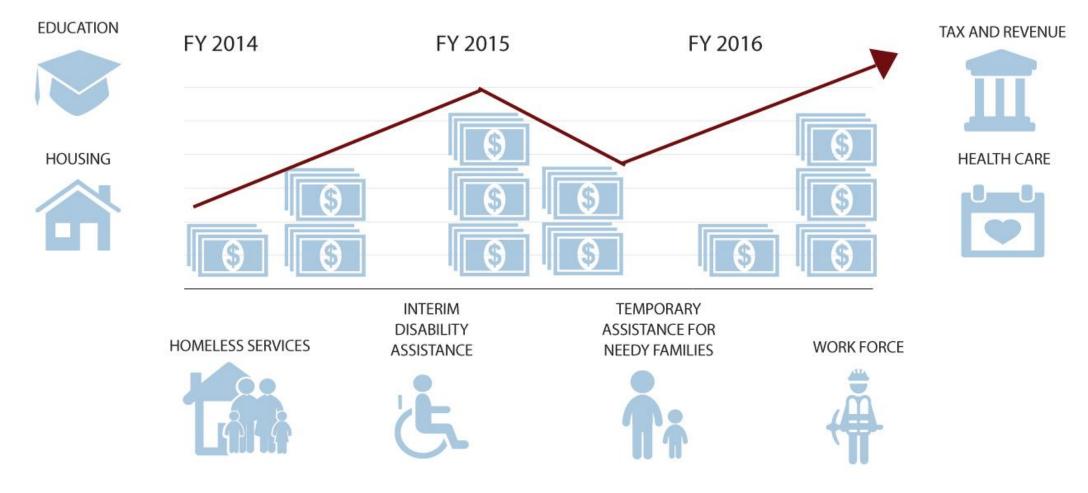
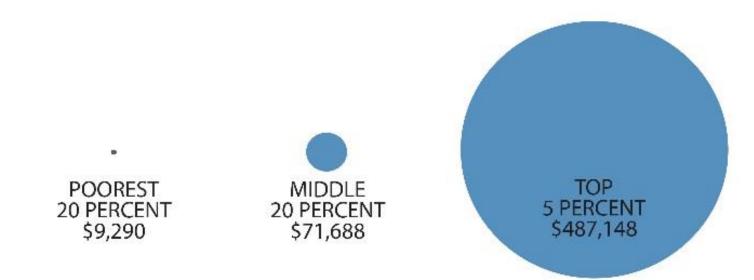

Income Inequality in DC Is Wide



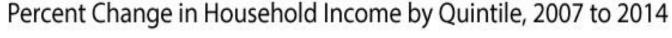
The richest 5 percent of DC households have an average income 52 times as large as the bottom 20 percent of households and nearly 7 times as large as the middle 20 percent of households

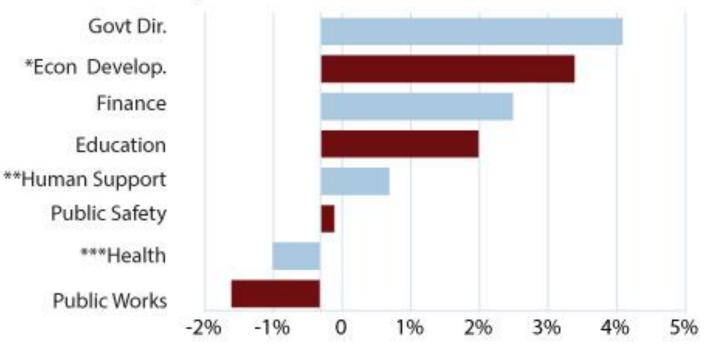

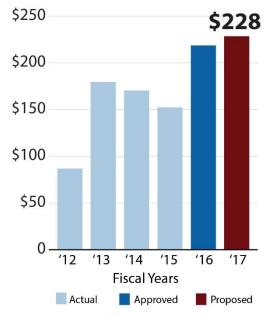

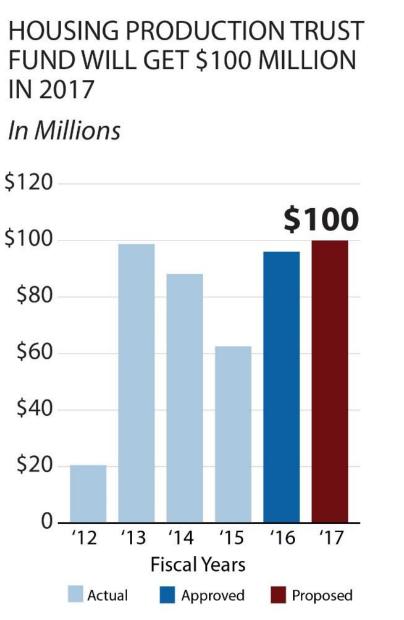

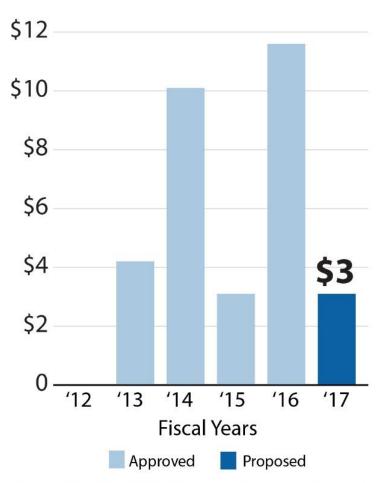


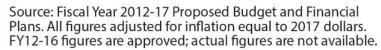

Increase from Previous Fiscal Year, In Millions

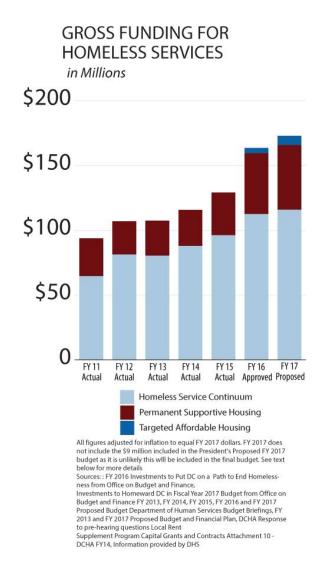

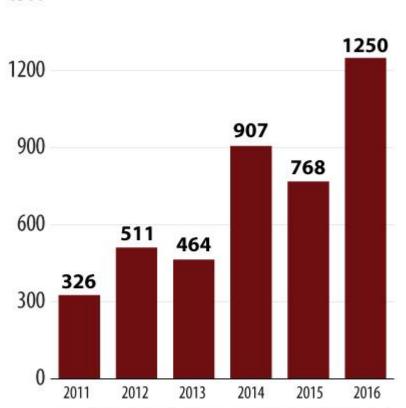

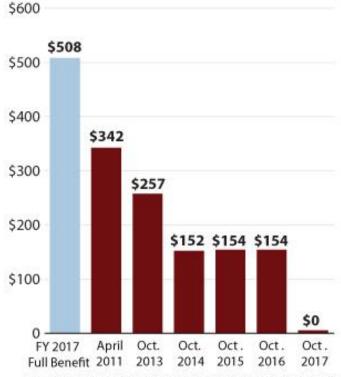

FY 2017 Budget Prevents 6,200 TANF Families From Being Cut Off, but Also Keeps Very Low Benefits

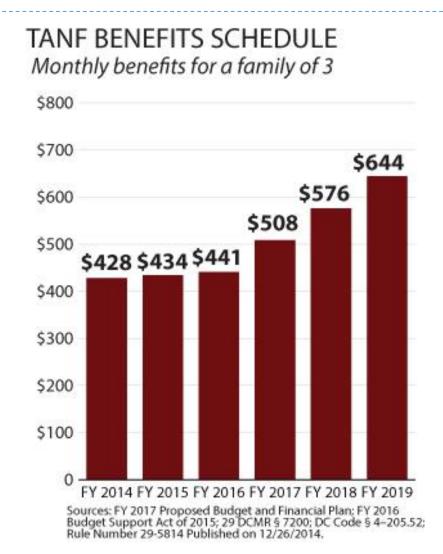
TANF BENEFITS FOR FAMILIES OVER 60 MONTHS Monthly benefits for a family of 3

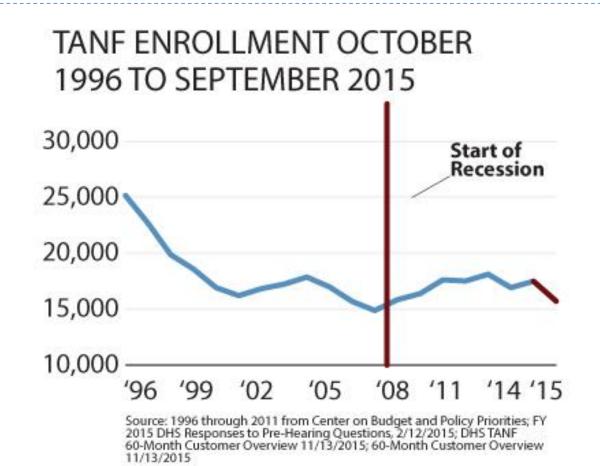


TANF Benefits Will Rise for Families Not Subject to Time Limit





DC Families on TANF Fell in 90s Before Time Limit & Have Stayed Roughly the Same for Over a Decade

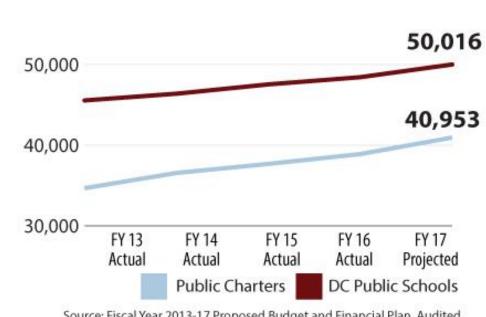




FY 2017 Reflects New Funding for Growing Enrollment In DCPS & Public Charter Schools

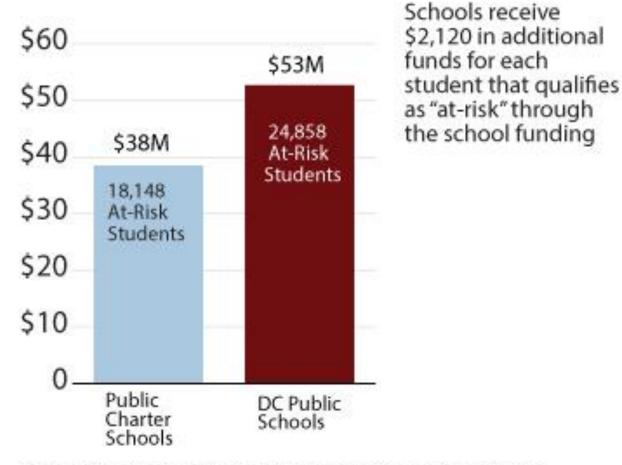

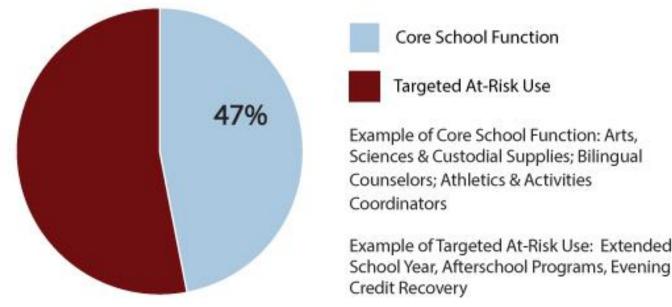

DCPS At-Risk Funds Are Not All Being Used To Supplement Services for Low-Income Students

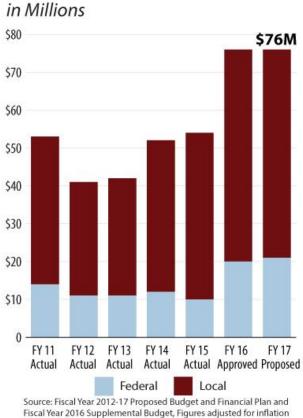
DCPS ALLOCATION OF \$47 MILLION IN "AT-RISK" FUNDS FOR 2016-17 SCHOOL YEAR

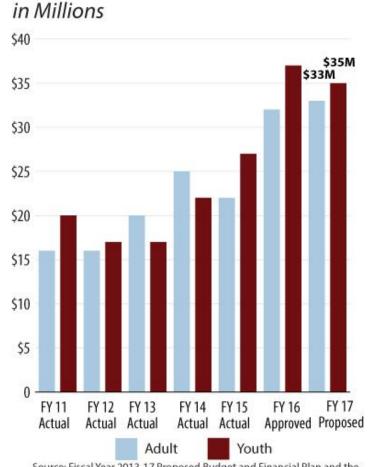


FY 2017 Funding for Workforce Development at the Department of Employment Services Is Flat

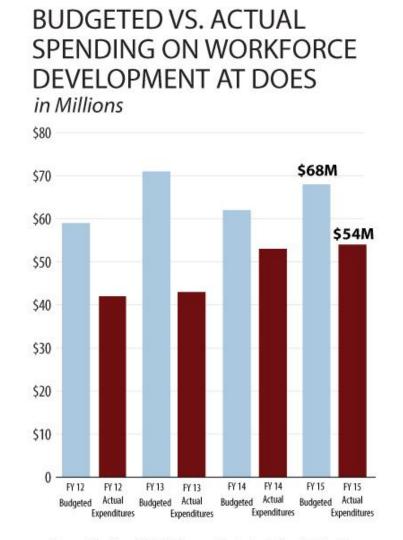
Funding for Youth Employment Is Now Higher Than for Adult Employment

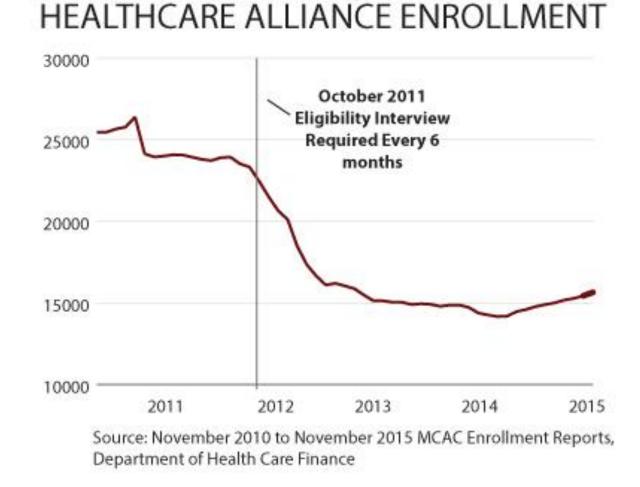
DOES Continue to Underspend Its Allocated Funding

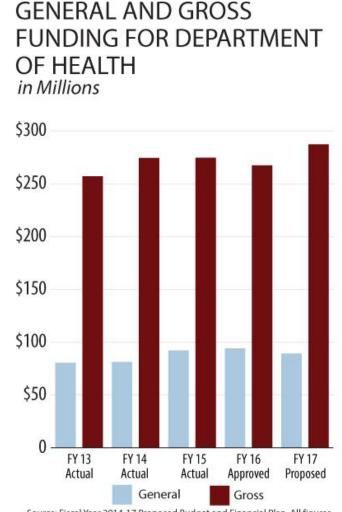
Budget Keeps Eligibility Rules That Have Limited Access to Health Insurance Through the Healthcare Alliance

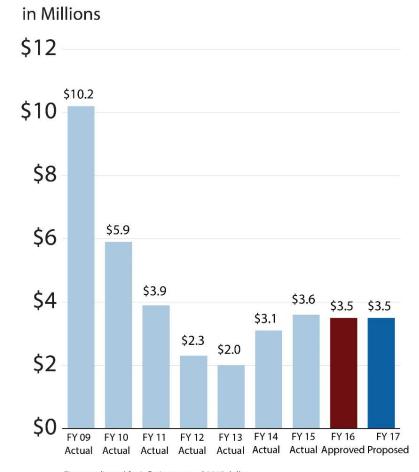
Health Spending Largely Flat in FY 2017

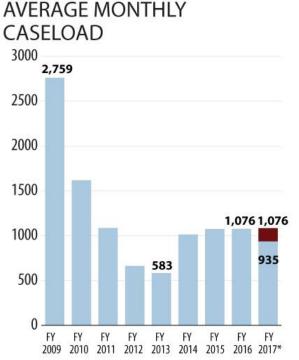
Funding for Interim Disability Assistance Has Been Cut Sharply Since 2009
